The 60 x 60 x 6' enclosure has dramatically improved the ability to exercise and socialize dogs at the shelter. 
Pokey and Sassy were seized on July 17th. Pokey had an embedded collar that required

During the month of June, board member, Diane Bandy and friend Ken Jakub (pictured), gave the Humane Society a refreshing facelift. The overall work included repairing the siding on the front facade, replacing the front door with a new one, equipped with a panic bar, a fresh paint job,

built and erected by volunteers on the shelter grounds tracked adoptions with giant paw prints that march up the sign. To everyone's astonishment, it didn't take a hundred days. It didn't even take 30 days. In just 22 days, we had reached our goal of 100 adoptions and so we went for 200! Then 300!

A dog training DVD or 3 sheets of kitty giftwrap were given to each of the first 100 adopters. In our 100 days, which ended on Friday, September 8th, a total of 430 animals had successfully been adopted!

Setting Goals and Completing Projects

The Washington Park Elementary School has been doing fundraisers for our shelter for several years now. Mrs. Johnson and her 3rd grade class chose our shelter as their yearly community service project. Each year Mrs. Johnson holds an assembly that includes the 4th and 5th grade classes. For the last two years, volunteer Jeannie Sexauer has taken Kacie, who was an abandoned dog that she adopted from the Washington Area Humane Society. Kacie and Jeannie teach the children about the Humane Society, safety with animals and animal care. The children give a small donation and they also see a movie provided by the school.

This year Mrs. Johnson and Jeannie decided to do something bigger to complete a much-needed project. The whole Elementary School – K through 5th grade got involved. Kacie and Jeannie went twice

to give their presentation. The school collected donations in the amount of \$710.00 for lumber to build the shade/rain pavilion that now spans the two large dog play kennels on the shelter grounds. Jeannie's husband Gus, volunteered to build the structure and it is used daily by the dogs and the volunteers. They would still like to install a floor for the

pavilion, but that will take a lot more money ... probably the goal for next year.

The faculty and students of Washington Park Elementary School set an example of what can be done with just a little from a lot of people. They did a fantastic job and all of the dogs, staff and volunteers at the Washington Area Humane Society thank them for it.

Why You Should Spay or Neuter Your Pets

One female dog and her offspring can be the source of 67,000 puppies over the course of 6 years. One female cat and her offspring can produce 420,000 kittens in seven years. In the United States alone, over 70,000 puppies and kittens are born every day. There will never be enough homes for these pets which leads to 8,000,000 - yes, that's eight million - unwanted dogs and cats being euthanized each year. Having your pet spayed or neutered can help reduce these numbers. In addition to controlling pet over-population, there are numerous other advantages to having your pet spayed or neutered. Altered pets live longer and healthier lives. A number of health risks such as uterine, ovarian, and testicular cancer, as well as prostate disease are reduced or eliminated in pets that are spayed or neutered by six months of age. Further, altered cats and dogs are less likely to bite, stray, or get into fights. They are also less likely to spray and mark territory. Dogs and cats that have been altered make better, more affectionate companions and exhibit less behavior and temperament problems than unaltered pets. WAHS offers a spay and neuter clinic at reasonable rates. Please contact the shelter for information.

His limp is from an old, but healed injury, causing no discomfort. He has full range of motion and requires no further medical attention.
